




Binnanewan ("Cecil Brim") was born *'in the bush'* in 1901 On Groves Creek, fourth child to Toby and Annie Brim living in the area behind Speewah to Stoney Creek called Gulgar. As a child, Cecil lost part of his ear from a bullet fired in a raid on Buluwai Country. In 1916, three years after Mona Mona mission opened, Cecil's parents made the difficult decision to save their remaining children, and along with his older sister Middie, the family was *'safely escorted'* to the mission.

Cecil married Gudembah ("Dinah Fullerton", Koko Bujundji) and they had 8 children Marita, Warren, Ivan, Milton, Ruth, Eunice, Ross and Annette (died as a baby). In 1955, Cecil and Dinah applied for an exemption to leave the mission (finally closed in 1962) and moved their family to Oak Forest. Cecil worked in forestry all his life and passed in 1984 at the age of 82.
