Terrestrial species including cassowary, tree kangaroos, birds, mammals, etc












### **PROJECT TEAM LEADERS:**

# Turtley incredible art for ReefBeat

A FAR North artist has created a giant turtle sculpture with a head big enough to stand in to raise the roof for the Reef-Beat music festival.

Imogen O'Neil of Art of ION at Kuranda was tasked with creating the turtle centrepiece to represent the theme of protecting the Great Barrier Reef. She used materials from around the Far North, including bamboo to create the framework, palm wraps for the beak, woven fronds for the shell and recycled foam rubber for the body.

"To me, turtles represent protection, and they're such beautiful, gentle creatures that make a perfect symbol for the Reef we need to protect," Ms O'Neil said.

ReefBeat festival kicks off today, from noon to 10pm at the Cairns Showgrounds.

It features blues guitarist Ash Grunwald, brass ensemble Bullhorn, and DJs Lickweed and OPIUO, joined by local favourites DrewBoy and DJ JeremyJ.
